DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S REPORT

- Most certainly our District Conference in early March at The Novotel in Wollongong stands out.
- We had well over 450 Rotarians, partners and friends who attended at some time over the weekend. The food and service from the hotel was amazing and we had an incredible speaker list.
- The excitement of all who attended was obvious, there was a great feeling about the Conference throughout the whole weekend and the feedback that I received following the Conference was extremely complimentary.
- I sincerely thank Ian and Carole Johnston and the entire Conference Committee for the hard work and long hours they put into making our Conference such a success.

Our club visits have been a real highlight for me and Judith. We have been exceptionally well received wherever we have gone, small clubs, big clubs; the welcome is still the same. Each club is unique, each club has their individual projects and every club is doing some amazing things in their local communities. Some are even making a real difference in our international communities.

The Rotary Foundation Million Dollar Dinner which we combined with District 9685 to hold at The Epping Club was a great success, with the target of \$1M from bequests and donations being achieved. Past RI President Bill Boyd was the Guest of Honour and the event was attended by around 350 Rotarians, partners and friends.

A number of clubs have celebrated special anniversaries this year, Ingleburn celebrated its 40th Anniversary, Picton and Kings Cross celebrated 50 years of service to the community, Granville and Padstow celebrated their 60th anniversaries and Rotary Club of Parramatta reach the milestone of 90 years of service.

Six clubs received special recognition from Rotary International.

Caringbah, Padstow, Holroyd, Corrimal, Fairy Meadow and Liverpool West received special awards from The Rotary Foundation for recent and cumulative donations to The Rotary Foundation.

Eight clubs, Cabramatta, Camden, Como-Jannali, Granville, Holroyd, Padstow, Randwick and West Wollongong were recognised for their significant contributions to the End Polio campaign.

Our New Generations programs continue to grow and thrive. Please read the reports provided by District New Generations Chair Cheryl Deguara. We are slowly moving back into Youth Exchange, working with D9685 to take two Inbound Students with perhaps another Inbound under our own banner in July. There have been numerous enquiries about Outbound Exchange for January next year. We are building a base for future re-growth of the program and I hope that clubs will embrace the opportunity.

The many and varied programs and projects in the area of Community Service have had another successful year. District Community Services Chair (also District Governor Nominee) Sue Haywood has provided reports on all programs.

We are indeed fortunate in District 9675 to have Training and Personal Development leader Bruce Farquharson on our Team. For a number of years now successive District Governors have enjoyed the luxury of having Bruce as our Training Chair. Bruce and his team have organised and lead numerous training sessions throughout the year increasing the knowledge and understanding of all participants.

PDG Barry Antees and his Club Extension Committee have been planning and consulting throughout the District, exploring opportunities for club growth within our District. There is great optimism that a new club will charter at Gregory Hills in the new Rotary Year with other possibilities also being explored.

The Governance Committee under the leadership of PDG Barry Thompson has achieved much this past year and I thank them sincerely for their commitment to raising the bar on governance in our District.

The Strategic Planning Committee after an extensive process of meetings and consultation has produced a Strategic Plan for our District which will provide direction and priorities and ensure that we continue to work towards common goals. The Plan is a living document which will be reviewed each year and actioned by the District Leadership team.

The Vocational Training Team visit to Vanuatu is finally about to happen with the Team leaving for Vanuatu in August. This project has been a long time from start to finish taking a couple of years. Funding for the trip is through accumulated profits from RESCA (Rotary Emergency Services Community Awards) and from District reserves. This financing was approved by a vote of Clubs at the AGM in November.

Our District website has moved forward considerably this past year in content, news, information and the quality of the District membership database. I sincerely thank Peter Townsend from the Rotary Club of Holroyd for his time and commitment to advancing and improving the website. The website will soon have a new, modern, fresh appearance. I encourage all Rotarians in our District to visit the site regularly and make use of all that it has to offer.

The District Bulletin has been produced monthly, with exception of Christmas; the quality of the presentation has been outstanding, the content interesting and informative, and the feedback that I have received has been extremely positive and complimentary. 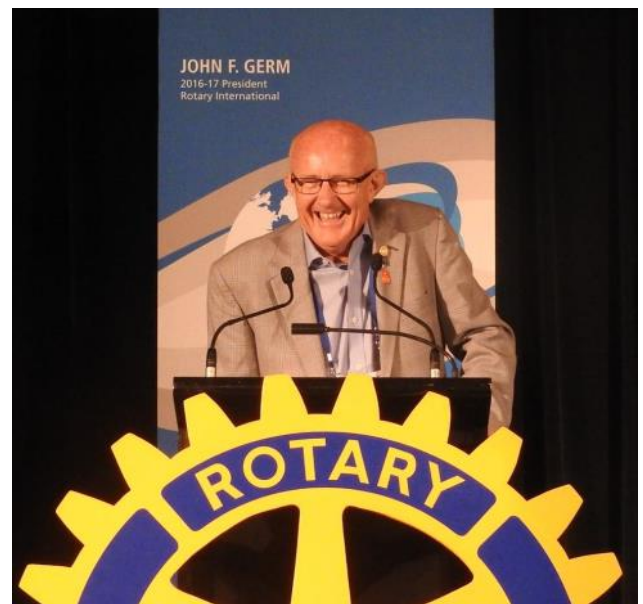

NEW GENERATIONS REPORT

The New Generations portfolio is an ever-evolving area of Rotary. Rotarians and Rotary Clubs that have engaged with the youth in their community no doubt have reaped the benefits of some vibrant young people.



This year we once again held Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (**RYPEN**) at two different venues. This concept has given clubs an opportunity to promote different venues (may be even closer to home) in two different tertiary years. The venue chosen for this Rotary Year was YMCA at Homebush and Teen Ranch at Cobbitty. **RYPEN** is a well-received program throughout the district with over 80 students attending over the two camps. The leadership team has had a balance of past leaders and the induction of some of our past RYLarians. The concept of bringing the RYLarians has been most beneficial, as we are now mentoring some very strong leaders. This year we have once again tweaked the program determined on the venue and on some of the feedback that we are receiving from past attendees and leaders. This has been a positive move that we feel only enhances the program within our District.



Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (**RYLA**) Yarramundi a most successful event that was held in very hot conditions. The Seminar team had prepared well for the camp – with team leaders engaging with the 62 nervous recipients prior to the week. The program once again changed slightly from previous years – with the team and the Seminar Leader being able to put their own flavour to the week. With the weather being so hot – gave challenges, but thank goodness for the water and the activity day on the river. Once again, the closing of the day with the Showcase gave the RYLarians an opportunity to sponsors, parents, friends and relatives what had happened over the week through their eyes. **RYLA** has a continue Mentor Program happening after camp which has become beneficial to the RYLarians reach their goals.



National Youth Science Forum (**NYSF**) continued to grow in interest in our district. Clubs are very supportive of students that have shown an interest in STEM. Having to pick once again 26 students out of 65 potential budding scientific minded young people was no mean feat but our capable team of interviewers

(consisting of Rotarians, Rotaractors, **NYSF** Alumni and RYLarians) were able to make some fine selections. Our process seems to challenge our young people but our interviewers come away feeling more knowledgeable in the field of science. I am sure sponsoring clubs have been able to see that their financial support in these young people well worth every dollar. We had one of the selection team, Vera Liondas attended one of the events in Canberra and District Chair, Stephen Lovison attend Canberra to give some feedback and meet up with his counterparts in other Districts.

Last year our winning teams from Model United Nations Assembly (**MUNA**) went to Canberra to compete against other Districts and we are pleased to say that St Andrews Cathedral School were winners overall and Sydney Boys High came in third. An outstanding result for District 9675.

Once again, we held MUNA in NSW Parliament House hosted by PP Hugh McDermott (State Member for Prospect). The memory of speaking in Parliament House can make an impact on young people's thoughts on being able to debate in an open forum.



Everyone agreed that the Resolution topic were quite thought provoking. Understanding that sometimes the views of the country that students represented would have been quite different to their own. Topics that were discussed at this **MUNA** were: Organ Donation, Violence Against Women, Definition of Gender and the Death Penalty. This year we will be sending St Patricks College, Sutherland, Merrylands High School and SCEGGS to Canberra to represent the District.

Rotaract have seen themselves on a little bit of a roller coaster. We as a District, have strong Rotaract support from within universities. This is where the clubs find that their numbers fluctuate, due to the degree and the

intensity of their workload. We still have the Provisional Rotaract Club of Western Sydney University, Parramatta. They have gone through some changes even while in the Provisional stage – all positive, with some dynamic personalities at the helm. This **Rotaract** year was about consolidating – having the clubs become focused and compliant with their obligations.

What has spawned out of **RYLA** is a Provisional Rotaract Club of Wollondilly. They have the support of the Rotary Clubs of Picton and Wollondilly North. This club is community based and are now meeting regularly with their sponsoring Rotary Clubs and has community involvement.



Rotary Youth Exchange (**RYE**) in our District has accreditation from Rotary International to operate Youth Exchange. We have worked with District 9685 to take on some inbound students where are being supported by Rotary Clubs of Corrimal and Caringbah and we look as if we may bring in our own student from Switzerland in July (we are still waiting confirmation). We have held an Interest Meeting for some young people wishing to go out on an exchange in January 2018, and since then more enquiries have been flowing through to the committee. With the exchanges now happening for the younger student and not the gap year – timing is everything for the family and the student.

Other programs that operate within our District for example, **Science Experience, Science and Engineering Challenge, RYDA** and **U Turn the Wheel** should not be forgotten. These programs while not part of every Rotary Clubs agenda have played an important part of New Generations engagement in District 9675.

The introduction of '**Form 3**' to be compliant with Volunteering with Youth has given some clubs a few challenges. This formality while seeming onerous on the surface will soon become a matter of procedure – especially when clubs are participated in youth projects within District and their communities.

A special acknowledgement and thank you should go to Richard Booth, who is stepping down from RYLA and RYPEN chair (his position has been taken on by two able Rotarians next year), his tireless work in these areas has been outstanding. He has helped to mould some great programs in our District. I did not let Richard get away, he will be the Chair of Interact for 2017/18.

I would personally like to thank all our New Generations Program Chairs and their committees. The tireless work that the teams have put into our District programs is a testament to the successfully year we have had once again. I also should acknowledge that some of the Chairs will be moving to new positions, they have been great mentors to their successors. Rotary International District 9675 New Generations has 'Served Humanity' with its vibrant programs.

Soap Aid

During the year progress was made in the collection of used soap from hotels in the Sydney CBD, Sydney Airport, Coogee and Blacktown City and surrounds. Since the commencement of the project in March 2015 and to 30 June 2016 just over 5 tonnes of soap had been collected. For this year the rate of collection has increased and a total of 4.5 tonnes was collected, bringing our total collections

since the project started to 9.5 tonnes, which equates to 95,000 100g bars of reprocessed soap, all for distribution to villages in need in India, Africa, Australia's Outback and the Pacific Islands.

The great work being done for the Sydney City Hotel Cluster has been possible through the individual effort of Jay Thorogood, RC of Darling Harbour. Not only does Jay collect soap from hotels and the Ralph Street Laundry but has also taken a more proactive role in fostering contact with key hotel housekeeping staff. A number of big hotels continue to provide support and huge amounts of soap and special mention must go to Rydges Airport, Darling Harbour Hotel at Star Casino and Ralph Street Laundry, who collect from hotels while delivering or collecting laundry.

The Rotary Club of Blacktown City is now involved in the project and is responsible for the Western Sydney Hotel Cluster. While still in the early phases of development some collections have been made and deposited in our Castle Hill storage point. Further work is needed during the coming 12 months to support this cluster.

Special thanks must go to AG John Given for his ongoing support in allowing us to use his business premises at Rockdale for the storage of soap. Thanks also must go to John's storeman, Steve, whose assistance in loading and unloading of stock is very much appreciated.

For this year, 2017/18, we hope to be able to add in hotels in Cronulla and Brighton Le Sands and to use these hotels as a base for a new hotel cluster, Sydney South. By the end of June 2018 we hope to have been able to increase annual collections to 7.5 tonnes.

Bowel Scan

As our program comes to a close this year it is with great sadness that we observe Richmond Manyweathers' passing in May this year. Richmond was a fantastic & enthusiastic champion for Bowelscan and will be sorely missed by all that new him. At Richmond's request a private funeral was conducted and on the 24th June a Memorial service was held at his home town of Alstonville. Neil & I attended the memorial with fellow Rotarians & friends.

The Bowelscan ran in 3 areas in District 9675. Illawarra, Sutherland Shire & scattered areas in the district. Our program ran for the month of May this year in conjunction with the National Bowelscan Program.

Our sales were down again this year in all areas of the District. Our sale price has remained consistent for the past 3 years at a price of \$15. The main reason for the drop in sales is the increased distribution of the National Bowel Cancer Screening by the Australian Government.

All Australians, who have a Medicare card or Department of Veterans' Affairs card, aged between 50 and 74 will be eligible for screening every 2 years, by 2020. This kit is free and mailed out to all who are eligible.

We are waiting on all testing to be completed before any accurate statistics can be made and will be completed before August.

With the decline in sales of kits in the past year it has been decided that the Bowelscan program will no longer run and This has been backed by the National Bowelscan Committee Inc. The wonderful uptake by the Australian Government will fill in our sale area and with the cost of running the program, it is does not remain viable.

Without the hard work and dedication of many Rotarians in many different clubs this very important Public Awareness Program would not be as successful as it is. Alf Harley has been a particularly dedicated and hardworking Rotarian from Corrimal Rotary Club for all the years that the Bowelscan Program has been running in the Illawarra Area. With his team he has pounded the pavement, put together TV and Radio advertisements', flyers and wonderful launches. Thank you Alf.

For many years SEALS at Sutherland Hospital tested and collated many, many, many Bowelscan kits. Without this wonderful support, particular Anita Burnie & Anita, the program would not have worked so well and diligently.

To Dr D Fenton-Lee, Gastroenterologist at Miranda/St Vincent's Hospitals a very big thank you for being our capable Medical Coordinator. The pharmacists throughout the Sutherland Shire and Illawarra, we thank you for your tireless commitment to our community and Rotary. They willing sold our collect the kits for the program for the entire program year after year. Thanking you is pleasure.

And finally we give a big thank you to you all who has supported the project over the many years the program has run.

Probus

This year In District 9675 we have divided the clubs into groups by geographical areas e.g. The Shire East – The Shire West – City West – St George etc. Meetings of most groups have been organised with varying degrees of enthusiasm. Some have held a number of meetings to address membership issues and the promotion of Probus in their areas.

Attendance and displays at local events and shopping centres have been organised and media advertising has been undertaken. One group has organised basic computer training, free of cost, at the local TAFE as well as fitness courses through the local council.

Training days for new office bearers were carried out in April at 7 venues. These were cooperative efforts with District 9685.

A new club was formed on 3 May at Gledswood Hills and a number of other possibilities are being explored. Unfortunately, one club, Fairfield City (formerly Prestons) handed in their charter. All members moved to Georges Hall Probus Club.

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library in D9675

In 2016-17 Dolly Parton's Imagination Library was a project of Macarthur Sunrise RC and of the combined Rotary Clubs of the Illawarra. The project was considered by some other clubs but not proceeded with.

Macarthur Sunrise RC has a project committee lead by Cathy Richardson. Most of their children attend one of the Wheely Good Fun playgroups run by their local Benevolent Society. In 2015 they began with 17 children from a Claymore playgroup. In August 2016, they added children attending the Ingleburn playgroup which increased their registrations to 31. More recently a group of children who have returned to their families after being in foster care have been included. Registrations now number 39, 13 of whom have parents from non-English speaking backgrounds. So far they have given 434 books to participating children. Funding has been from the club and some specific fundraising activities. They would like to offer the program to more children and are waiting for the outcomes of recent grant applications that would enable this to happen.



Imagination Library Illawarra is a joint project of all of Illawarra's Rotary clubs and has a multi-club committee, chaired by Sue Clark. Most of the children attend one of several Barnardos supported playgroups, or a preschool for Aboriginal children. Illawarra's project began in 2014 – it was one of the collaborative projects PDG Garry Browne initiated - and to date has been funded by Illawarra's Rotary clubs, an IMB Foundation grant, United Way, individual donations and a local business. During the 3 years, 519 children have been registered for various lengths of time, of these 250 are currently registered, and together they have received more than 9000 books. The IMB grant is nearly spent so the number of children must be reduced, hopefully through graduations and without having to terminate any registrations. The project has had wonderful financial support from Illawarra's Rotary clubs and some individual Rotarians, but so as not to depend on Rotary donations alone, at least one annual fundraiser is being arranged and any possible grants, including 2 recently submitted, will be applied for.



The DPIL project is a great way to give a disadvantaged child a hand up! It helps the child develop language and literacy skills, the ability to listen and follow a story, and even increases their confidence and self esteem! The project has also been credited with improving family relationships! \$90 pays for a year's supply of (12) books and the project can be started with almost any budget. VOCATIONAL SERVICES REPORT

The Rotary Clubs of NSW Police Officer of the Year Awards

Another very successful event was held on 3 November 2016 at the Dockside Pavilion, Darling Harbour. Just over \$26,000 was raised and distributed between Police Legacy, The Rotary Foundation and Rotaract.

Although fundraising plays only a small part of the evening the generosity of all those who have attended has seen us raise in excess of \$233,000 over the last seven years.

Nominations from across the State increased presenting a very challenging time for the judges. Being a judge for the first time, it really opened my eyes to just how difficult it was to separate the final winners of each category.

As you know the evening is about the Community through Rotary, recognising and rewarding excellence in Policing.

Although we were disappointed that the Foundation did not support the project with a Global Grant, we were very encouraged when District Clubs showed their overwhelming support by stepping up with additional funds in February.

In addition to facilitating the training of Vanuatu Emergency Services Professionals regarding the latest thinking and best practices relating to emergency and disaster preparedness, the project will help save lives in the event of local emergencies and/or natural disasters and assist communities and businesses to more effectively respond to emergencies and re-establish their lives and ongoing economic development.

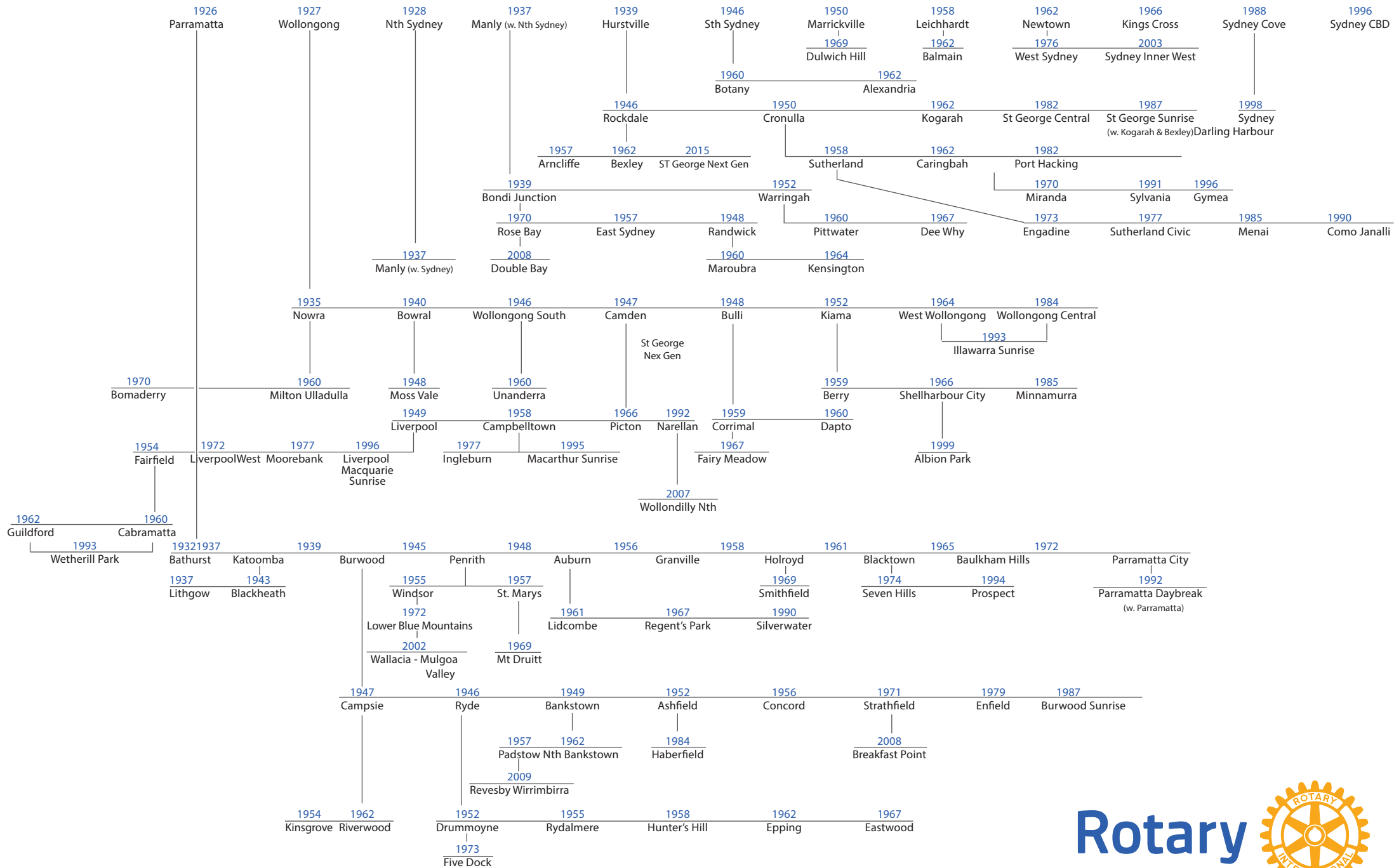
